Ina Daly has had a lifetime of association with and support of the Marist Sisters and Marist College. Her father, Tom, was one of the parishioners who met Mother Bernard and Sr Austin on their arrival in Auckland January 1927. Her sister, Maureen was a first day pupil at Marist



Primary and the oldest surviving ex-students of the College at her death in 2020. The Dalys lived just across the road from the church in Kitenui Ave. Ina was a student at the College from 1940 - 1943. She then went on to a career in office administration.

She played a key role in the Ex-students Association, remaining its president for many years up until 1979. Such was her support of the sisters, that she was invited to be a member of the Advisory Board for the College established in 1975. She was the secretary. She was elected to the first Board of Governors in 1978 and remained a member until 1986. May she rest in peace.

Social Media, Cybersafety and Mental Health

Would you allow your child to cross the road, without first teaching them how to cross safely?

Would you allow your child to swim at a beach with no lifeguards, or parental supervision?

Do you allow your child to navigate social media, without parental support, guidance and open conversations?

Recently *Paddy Gower's Got Issues* on TV3 ran a story on the dangers for young people online, and how this is linked to cyber-bullying and mental health issues.

Child psychologist Dr Emma Woodward was guest on this programme. She said that in her professional opinion young people under the age of 15-16 years old are not mature enough to manage a smartphone (internet capable phone.) They should instead have a simple cellphone that allows text and phone calls only (much like we had as young people.) Think early Nokia phones. At Marist College most students from Year 7 have smartphones – we feel this is something families could reconsider.

Netsafe recommends parents having open and honest conversations with their children about what they are doing online.

Tip #2 Learn: Ask your child about what they do, how they use devices and who they talk to learn about their activities. Check in regularly to see what has changed. Consider if your child needs a SMART phone.
