Pacific Health Wayfinders - Year 11 **Taster Day at University of Auckland**

Pacific Health Wayfinders (PHW) is an organisation within Auckland University with the goal of encouraging Pasifika students who want to pursue study and training in a medical or health career. PHW has been initiated in an effort to increase the proportion of Pasifika people in the health workforce. To be eligible for the programme, students must have Pacific ancestry and be taking Science and English-rich subjects. Eight Year 11 students attended a Taster Day event held at the medical school where they heard presentations about studying Nursing, Optometry, Population Health, Medical Imaging, Pharmacy, and Medicine, and how to get into these pathways at University of Auckland. The students also undertook a number of





interactive activities including using optometry equipment, looking at Xrays to check for broken bones, and examining statistical charts and graphs to identify whether certain groups in the population suffered more from some types of cancer than others, and try to identify possible causes. It was a very informative and inspiring day offering the students a greater understanding of different types of health careers and how to get into these different pathways.



The notes for me could signify that the song being sung by the lady is the national anthem "Pambansang Awit ng Pilipinas."
