From the Principal

On the 14th of September 1972, the Māori Language Petition was presented to Parliament. With over 30,000 signatures, the petition played a significant role in the journey to revitalise Te Reo Māori by calling for the government to recognise the language as sacred to Aotearoa. The petition was a was fundamental moment in the history of Te Reo Māori - reclaiming its place as an official New

Zealand language.

Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori is an opportunity to reflect on our own personal journeys with Te Reo Māori. As a school it is an important time to remember how far we have come in our ability to offer Te Reo Māori as a subject. It is also an opportunity to review our part in contributing to our nation's goal of having one million Te Reo Māori speakers by 2040.

Thank you to our Kaiawhina, students and staff who organised events and activities to make this week a true celebration of language and culture. A special thank you to Whaea Jane















who worked with our students to make enough fried bread to feed the school. Ngā mihi nui.

Every four years the Catholic Education Office visit Marist College to review our school policies and practices. The focus of the review is to ensure that we are providing a full and holistic Catholic education for all of our students. It is an opportunity to celebrate our success and set goals for the next four years. Preparation and planning for a review takes time, with many staff taking on extra responsibilities to ensure that the review team have an authentic Marist experience. Thank you to our staff, students and parent community who have dedicated their time to support the school and the review team.

Today we acknowledged eight of our Marist artists whose works were selected to be part of the Ringa Toi NZQA Toi Maori and Toi Moana exhibition at Te Papa. commendation in the Toi Whaka-ahua category. It's a huge honour to have their work exhibited in such a special place and to see their work recognised for its high standard in Aotearoa.


These are small group or individual lessons in a range of instruments including voice, which are subsidised by the government to prepare Music option students for NCEA.
