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In Memory of Faustina



NCEA Level 1 Information Evening

Thank you to everyone who attended the Year 10 and 11 NCEA Level 1 Information Evening on Monday. We hope that the evening was informative and we appreciated the thoughtful questions that were asked on the night.

If you could not attend the evening, the presentation and handbook can be found here. Both documents contain key information about the structure of NCEA, Level 1 NCEA Information Evening



NCEA Level 1

NCEA stands for the Nationa Certificates of Educational Achievement. It is the main qualification for secondary school students and it's avail recognised. NCEA Level 1 for



school students and it's available at Levels 1, 2 and 3. NCEA is internationally recognised. NCEA Level 1 focuses on building skills and knowledge in specific learning areas, providing students with the foundation they need to achieve in specialised subjects as they move through NCEA Level 2 and 3.

NCEA has been recently refreshed to ensure it is a robust, coherent and inclusive qualification. Students will be taught a broad range of knowledge and skills in each subject area, with assessment failing out of the learning that takes place in class. It is important that students understand that only some of the learning that takes place in the classroom will be assessed, however all the learning that takes place in class is important. A year long programme has been developed by teachers to provide students with the foundational knowledge and skills required to move forward with each subject area in NCEA Level 2 and 3.

This handbook will outline the structure of NCEA Level 1 at Marist College.

Every subject that your daughter takes in Level 1 is assessed by standards. The standards describe different areas of knowledge and skills in a learning area. Each standard is wort credits. When your daughter achieves a standard, she will earn credits towards her NCE4 qualification. Talk with your daughter about what she is learning in class and the standards she is working towards. This will support her with her learning.

To gain Level 1 NCEA students need to achieve the following: • 60 credits at Level 1

- 10 Literacy co-requisite credits
 10 Numeracy co-requisite credit:
- 10 Numeracy co-requisite credits

including the Literacy and Numeracy Co-Requisite.



University of Canterbury Science Summer Camp

Over the summer holidays I attended the Science Summer Camp at University of Canterbury. 2023 was also the 150th anniversary of the University, and this played a big part in our group project for the camp. The 5-day programme gave a broad introduction into the fields of Physics, Chemistry, Ecology, Biosecurity, Engineering and Biological photography. I especially enjoyed Chemistry where we were able to investigate pharmacology by synthesising aspirin using salicylic acid.

The science camp also included a day excursion to the Cass Field Research Station situated in the Southern Alps. We learnt about the connections local Tangata Whenua had to the land and the problems faced by the area. We worked in groups solving a problem the Cass area faced and we presented our solutions in a Dragons Den, making sure to use our 15-month, 15-year, 150-year timeframe.



This was my first time leaving home and going into an

unfamiliar situation with no one I knew, and I was able to meet and connect with so many driven and amazing students who were interested in similar and different things to me. Attending the UC Science Summer Camp has certainly increased my confidence, leadership and teamwork and I am incredibly grateful to have been offered the opportunity to go.

Nerd Camp

In January, I was given the incredible opportunity to spend two weeks at the 34th Rotary National Science and Technology Forum, otherwise dubbed affectionately as Nerd Camp. I learnt about 13 different STEM disciplines offered by the University of Auckland, AUT and Massey University which felt like an absolute whirlwind and I am so grateful to have been able to experience it. The tech visits were certainly a highlight of this Forum, being able to look deeper into fingerprinting and forensics with NZ Police, learning more about environmental science at Living Labs and experiencing non-invasive testing and other cuttingedge engineering at HERA was certainly something I could never do without the Forum. Every day was filled with our



academic modules, evening activities, and team-building and I am so incredibly grateful to have shared it with 167 other Year 13 students from across NZ.

Two of my favourite modules were biomedical science, where we dissected a sheep lung and heart and looked at plasticised human hearts and torsos. We also looked at sports science, where we were able to undergo physical tests and experience equipment professional athletes use, such as a VO2 machine. Alongside the academic work, the Dragons Den challenge and volleyball competition were an amazing way to get to know the 27 other people in my team. I can truly say that the people I have met here are some of the most amazing and driven people I have ever met. Since attending the Forum, I have gained insight into the incredible range of careers and fields offered in STEM and being able to experience University life was an incredible eye-opening and informative experience.
