Tertiary Information Events

The main universities and tertiary providers host campus open days and information evenings for prospective students to attend. Parents, caregivers and whanau are always welcome at these. Attending these kinds of events is helpful for students at all stages of thinking about their next steps beyond school.

For those who are just starting to think about their future, the information on offer can help to spark ideas of the options for study and training available. Those who have some clarity about their goals and interests are able to find more detail, in order to hone in on their choice of programme or institution. Sometimes students gain completely new ideas and insights just from hearing the questions and discussions of others. Ideally students will start visiting a few events in Year 11, and ensure they attend their preferred institutions events in Year 12 and 13. 

Google - in read&write

Currently all students at Marist College have access to Google Read and Write. It is very easy to dictate into and learns you quickly (updating to adjust and understand your individual voice.) Your text can be read back to you in an accent, speed and gender of your choice. Another very popular aspect is the predictive text feature.

It's a great idea to practise learning to use this app at home. The more you use it the better you get at it- and it is highly recommended as it reduces cognitive load. The app is especially helpful for anyone with reading and writing learning difficulties.

Running Late to School? What should I do?

If students are running late to school, we need to know. Students who arrive to school after 8:30am (or 8:55am on Tuesdays) MUST sign in at the office. If students are running late and are in the car with parent or caregiver, they could write a note for their parent to sign and then present this at the office. Or parents can notify the school via SchoolBridge app, email or phone when they are in a position to do so.

If students are running late and are on public transport or are walking, they should contact a parent or caregiver to notify the school that they are running late. Parents can notify the school via SchoolBridge or phone or email.

Students who arrive late to school without explanation from a parent/caregiver must go on detention at Break 1 that day. If they miss the detention, they will have an additional detention. If they miss the second detention, the dean will be involved and the situation will escalate, and parents may be called in.
