From the Deputy Principal

May is a month of many things – Mary, multiple sports teams, major tests and music. Last week's newsletter paid tribute to those involved in the musical, but they are not the only musical talent in the school. Throughout this month, the sound of string instruments, pianos and sweet vocal harmonies have rung out through the school from





a variety of venues. The new-ish stage area, with its vibrant mural, was christened during break times this month. A small intimate venue, it provides our talented musicians with a new space to play, with surprisingly good acoustics.

Our Patrons' Mass, with a focus on The Work of Mary, was a joyful yet serene event on Thursday. While there may be debate over whether to describe Champagnat, Chavoin, Colin and Chanel as Patrons or Founders, there is



no question that the impetus of their calling was the work of Mary and that in following their footsteps, we too can aim to live, think and act as Mary would in the world today. We thank all of those students, particularly House Leaders, staff and religious who worked so hard to make our Mass a celebration of faith for our school community.

The school celebrated Samoan Language week with many activities provided for the girls to engage with and appreciate the beauty of Samoan culture. It was wonderful to see so many puletasi being worn with pride on Friday.

A testing event for all Year 10 and a number of Year 11 students was the CAA Numeracy and Literacy digital examinations held on this week. Students appeared well-prepared by both the Maths and English Departments. These NZQA provided examinations do raise the levels of stress in both staff and students due to the sometimes fickle nature of NZQA's digital platform. Our aim is to ensure that if a student does experience being 'locked out' of an exam, that we will always provide them with a fresh opportunity to sit and succeed and will follow up with NZQA. Learning in a digital world can have challenges but our job is to make sure that gaining access to this type of assessment is available to all.

Multiple sports teams is a feature of Marist. We are lucky to have a wide range of codes available to the girls despite our small size comparative to our rival sporting schools. Marist Rugby has started their season and are showing great determination and drive. As some of the team leave my English class on a Monday, my request is always "three tries and at least one conversion please." Their win against Papatoetoe this week is testament to their speed and attacking game. The three tries definitely happened – still waiting on that conversion.

Marist Netball Premier team is the other hot topic around the coffee machine in the staffroom. Their recent games have been well-attended by staff, whanau and student supporters on Saturday mornings at St Johns. We certainly appreciate the enthusiasm with which our supporters back our girls, however, always aim to show respect, good sportswomanship and consideration for the opposition. It's just another good opportunity to think and act as Mary would.






Currently all students at Marist College have access to Google Read and Write. It is very easy to dictate into and learns you quickly (updating to adjust and understand your individual voice.) Your text can be read back to you in an accent, speed and gender of your choice. Another very popular aspect is the predictive text feature.

It's a great idea to practise learning to use this app at home. The more you use it the better you get at it- and it is highly recommended as it reduces cognitive load. The app is especially helpful for anyone with reading and writing learning difficulties.
