St Marcellin Champagnat, born on May 20, 1789, in the village of Le Rosey, France, was the founder of the Marist Brothers, originally known as the Little Brothers of Mary. Coming from a French peasant family, Marcellin faced educational challenges early on, dropping out of school before joining the seminary at 16.

Marcellin devoted his life to educating and upholding young people's spiritual

growth, especially those who lived in underprivileged, rural areas. His legacy continues in the Marist communities' constant commitment to school life and the principles of hard work, humility, and simplicity. His life serves as an example of how hard work and faith can change people's lives.

His guiding motto was, "All to Jesus through Mary, and all to Mary for Jesus." Champagnat passed away in June 1840 and was later beatified and canonised by Pope John Paul II in 1999. Today, and 25 years after his canonisation, his legacy lives on through the Marist Brothers' mission, with educational institutions in over 80 countries continuing his work. His feast day is celebrated on 6 June.

Thank you to the Champagnat House Leaders, Izzy and Rochelle and their team for organising and leading the whole school liturgy today.

Prayer: O God, who for the spreading of your Church crowned St Marcellin Champagnat with martyrdom, grant that, in these days of paschal joy, we may so celebrate the mysteries of Christ's Death and Resurrection as to bear worthy witness to newness of life.

Legal Mooting Competition

For the first time, Marist has been competing in the Auckland Student's Legal Mooting Competition. This competition aims to provide high school students with the opportunity to learn and further develop their debating skills with a stronger focus on legal thinking and argument building. The goal is to foster interest in the study of law and the wider legal profession, while providing students with the skills they need to be critical thinkers. Each round our Year 12 and 13 students were provided with a case file which they used to prepare opening and closing submissions and examination questions for witnesses. They then acted as the Plaintiff or

Defence in a mock trial, in front of a judge who gave detailed feedback on their argument and presentation of the facts of the case. It was wonderful to see our students challenge themselves and build their confidence and they learnt the process of addressing the court and thinking on their feet to counter the other team's arguments.

We were lucky enough to have the support of litigators who provided our teams with advice on the competition and how to prepare for it. We would like to say a big thank you to Jonathan Wood and Rosie Allison at Court One, and Ariana Stuart at Hesketh Henry for so generously sharing their time and expertise with our students.








8R Rice Bowls


