From the Deputy Principal

Matariki brings us a wonderful opportunity to welcome whānau to school to join us on our annual Hikoi up Owairaka Maunga just before dawn to see the Matariki stars. On our return from this spiritual reflective journey we are nourished with a hot breakfast, good company and lovely waiata before embarking on our day. The skies were clear and the stars visible on Wednesday morning and the breakfast was delicious – thank you to our Kapa Haka Rōpū for your waiata, Brooke Sorenson and Māori committee for sharing mātauranga and karakia for the stars, and the staff who prepared our breakfast.

Our Kaiawhina Brooke Sorenson spoke beautifully at our Matariki assembly. Here is an extract from her speech:

For Māori, the rising of Matariki signals te Mātahi o te Tau, the Māori New Year. The appearance of Matariki in the morning sky is a sign for people to gather, to honour the dead, celebrate the present, and plan for the future. Historically, the stars of Matariki were also closely tied to planting, harvesting and hunting. If the stars appeared clear and bright, it signified an abundant season ahead.

Matariki can be translated as 'little eyes' or 'small eyes.' The name comes from the phrase 'Ngā mata o te ariki Tāwhirimātea', 'the eyes of the god Tāwhirimātea'.

According to this korero the name finds its origins in the separation of Ranginui and Papatūānuku. After Tāne separated the sky from the earth, Tāwhirimātea waged war against him and the other gods, for he wanted his parents to remain together. In a display of rage against his brothers and a sign of love for his father, Tāwhirimātea plucked out his eyes, crushed them in his hands, and threw them into the sky where they stuck to his father's chest and became the stars of Matariki.

This morning myself, some students, teachers and our families made the trip up to Owairaka to go see the matariki stars. It's quite a spiritual experience and this year we were able to see the Matariki stars. On the Maunga we spent some time reflecting and setting our goals and dreams for our new year. I suggest you have your own reflection, to think about your loved ones who have passed, to appreciate the present and plan for the future.

We wish you and your whanau a restful long weekend, ready for a busy final week of term.

Hollywood Glam School Ball


