Mary, Queen of heaven and earth

Thursday 22nd August, the Catholic Church celebrated another important belief about the life of Mary, Mother of God. Pope Pius XII established this feast day in 1954 as 'The Queenship of the Blessed Virgin'. This special day has roots in Scripture. For example, in the Annunciation, the angel Gabriel announced that Mary's Son would receive the throne of David and rule forever. Similarly, in the Visitation, Elizabeth calls Mary "mother of my Lord." Mary's queenship is thus essentially a sharing in her Son, Jesus' kingship.

At the Annunciation Mary trusted in God's divine plan for her and said "yes". Mary did not only agree to be the mother of Jesus she also put her trust in God's will wholeheartedly and remained faithful till her death. Last

Friday, here at Marist College, we celebrated the event of the Assumption of Mary in our Marist Day Mass. It makes sense that after the event of Mary being taken up to heaven, body and soul in the Assumption, the Church now celebrates her 'Coronation as the Queen of heaven and earth'.

It is clear from our Catholic Tradition, that Mary truly deserves the title of Queenship because she is the Mother of God. Mary is such an inspirational person in our Marist College community because we strive to imitate her in all the things we do daily.

New Zealand Engineering Science Challenge

On the 10th August, 3 teams of senior students competed in the New Zealand Engineering Science Challenge. Our goal was to find a mathematical model that could answer a proposed open-ended question. This year's question was "How many airships would it take to

replace the Cook Strait Ferries?" We had 8 hours to come up with our mathematical model and write a report detailing our findings.

The challenge entailed interpreting the question and finding a way to solve it, creating the mathematical model considering all the different variables, and doing research on current airship capabilities. All of this was neatly summed into a scientific report where we defended our decisions and more importantly, showed how our mathematical model worked, and the number of airships required to replace the ferries.

This was an incredibly challenging competition but it has been a rewarding experience,

allowing me to engage in a form of engineering and all the hard work that goes into it. I would highly recommend any students interested in engineering to have a go at this competition next year!










Congratulations




