Core Values

Underpinning Marist College values are the theological virtues that come from God and lead to God. Cardinal virtues that are human virtues, acquired by education and good actions. These virtues are qualities of moral goodness.

- The **theological virtues** are faith, hope and charity.
- The **cardinal virtues** are prudence, justice, fortitude and temperance.

With these theological and cardinal virtues as our basis we strive to live these Gospel values in thoughts, actions, and interactions by living our school values in our everyday lives.

Engaging fully in life, in a simple, gentle, compassionate way working to build community.

The College Shield

- The Marist symbols "A" and "M" represent the Latin words "Ave Maria" which mean "Hail Mary".
- The twelve stars above the letters are also a symbol of Mary, taken from the Book of Revelations, Chapter 12.
- Beneath the central shield is an open book representing learning under the guidance of Mary.
- To the left of the shield is a branch of laurel leaves signifying "honour".
- To the right of the shield is the stem of a lily flower signifying "purity".
- Beneath the shield are the Latin words "*Ad Jesum per Mariam*" which mean "*To Jesus through Mary*", which is our College motto.



The Marist Family

The Marist project began in France in the nineteenth century, in the time after the French Revolution. The founders were people from country villages. They were mainly farmers, and also worked in crafts like weaving in the winter months.

Background

The Marist tradition of education originated in France in the early nineteenth century with Jean-Claude Colin and Marcellin Champagnat. Jeanne-Marie Chavoïn was the foundress of the Marist Sisters. The College values its traditions, and its continued links, with the Marist Sisters.

Marist House Patrons

St Peter Chanel 1803-1841

Peter Chanel came from a peasant family near Cuët in the diocese of Belley, France. His schooling occurred during winter and in summer he helped herd cows. At the age of 19 he entered the seminary and was ordained a priest in 1827. Chanel joined the Marist project in 1831. In 1836 he was among the first Catholic missionaries to go to Western Oceania.



Three months after leaving France he landed at the island of Futuna along with two others. Chanel worked hard to win the trust and support of the people of Futuna but some were suspicious. When one of the chief's sons showed an interest in being baptised, Peter Chanel's life was in danger. He was killed one morning by a blow from an axe.

A number of years later all the people of Futuna became Catholic. Peter Chanel was declared a saint in 1954. His feast day is April 28th. Chanel House colour is yellow.

St Marcellin Champagnat 1789-1840

St Marcellin Champagnat was born in France in 1789, the same year the French Revolution began. The political and social unrest of these times profoundly affected the direction his life took.



Marcellin Champagnat was a man who found study hard and he struggled with many aspects of his studies as he trained for the priesthood. One day on his pastoral rounds he found a 15 year old boy who was dying. This boy had never learnt the basics of the Christian faith. Champagnat was concerned about the boy's ignorance of God but was also concerned about his general lack of education.

Champagnat had a love of children and with a group of other young men he set up the first Marist schools. He is also the founder of the Marist Brothers. When the brothers weren't teaching they made nails which they sold and the money was then put towards the education of children. Marcellin Champagnat died in 1840 and was made a saint in 1999. His feast day is June 6th. Champagnat House colour is blue.

Jeanne-Marie Chavoïn 1786-1858

Jeanne-Marie Chavoïn was born on August 29th, 1786, in the village of Coutouvre, France. Her father was the village tailor and she learnt to deal with people through her work with him. Jeanne-Marie had little formal education but learned many skills from living in her village community, in caring for people and through prayer and meditation.



Jeanne-Marie knew she wished to dedicate her life to God but astounded people by refusing four offers to join religious orders! When she was 31 years old she received a letter from Fr Pierre Colin (the brother of Jean-Claude Colin) to assist in the Marist project. She knew immediately that this was her calling from God. Jeanne-Marie Chavoïn and Jean-Claude Colin are the co-founders of the Marist Sisters.

Jeanne-Marie Chavoïn always wanted her sisters to be active in their religious life by helping ordinary people in their everyday struggles and to help them grow in their faith. She died on June 30th, 1858, at the age of 71. Chavoïn House colour is red.

Jean-Claude Colin 1790-1875

Jean-Claude Colin was born on August 7th, 1790. He was the second youngest of nine children whose parents died before Colin was five years old. When he was at the seminary he heard about the Marist project and joined this, along with Champagnat. Colin was one of 12 young men who made a pledge to do all they could to found the Society of Mary.



After he was ordained, Colin went to work with his brother, Fr Pierre Colin in Cerdon and there he became a popular and lively preacher. During this time Champagnat started the Marist Brothers and the Colin brothers invited Jeanne-Marie Chavoin to help establish the Marist Sisters. He also worked with Peter Chanel. Colin was the Superior General of the Society of Mary from 1836 – 1854. He wrote guidelines and tasks for the Marists. Jean-Claude Colin died on November 15th, 1875, and is buried in the chapel in La Neyliere. Colin House colour is green.

Developing a Culture of Pride and Respect

Code of Conduct

Marist College expects each student to co-operate fully by taking responsibility for her own progress through preparation for, and participation in, all classes she attends. This requires showing concern for the need of others to pursue their studies without interference, behaving appropriately at Marist College, both within and outside the classroom, and respecting all other teachers and staff.

It is essential that students develop respect for themselves as individuals and as Marist College students. Marist College therefore requires students to conduct themselves at all times, in a manner that will enhance their reputation and that of others at Marist College. There is zero tolerance for verbal/non-verbal abuse, cyber abuse and illegal behaviour, eg theft.

Marist College students are expected to:

- Live Catholic Values in the Spirit of Mary.
- Treat members of the Marist College community and visitors with courtesy and respect.
- Take responsibility for their own behaviour and learning.
- Respect and take responsibility for school, personal and others' property.
- Wear the Marist College uniform with pride.
- Conduct themselves with dignity at all times in a manner which will enhance their own reputation and that of Marist College.

- Be punctual and attend all classes, unless illness or approved absence prevents attendance.
- Remain on the Marist College property throughout the day unless permission to leave is granted by the appropriate person.
- Abide by the rules of Marist College at all times.
- Look after our environment and recycle waste.

- We practice discernment.


Attitudes

A Marist approach to education

The Catholic school is an ecclesial entity, reflecting the “deepest nature” of the Church in its life, and participating fully in the Church’s mission by forming Christ in the lives of other.

A Marist approach to education is **essentially personal** – aimed at the good of the individual student made in the image of God, with a destiny beyond this world – having a profound respect for and interest in each student, **being concerned for her total development as a person** – body, mind and spirit.

- It provides an experience of **Christian community** and **a sense of belonging to the wider community of the Church**. Teachers united among themselves and dedicated to their work, are an essential witness to students.
- In a Marist school the building of community takes place in a **“family” atmosphere, reflecting motherliness of Mary**. This involves the acceptance of differences among students, not demanding more of students than they can reasonably give, but drawing from each one what she is capable of giving, creating an atmosphere of joy, working with patience and confidence. Respect for the person also means that knowledge is not imparted solely from without. The teacher allows and helps the student to search for and discover meaning for herself.
- It offers a synthesis of faith and life. **Education-in-faith and for justice** is of primary importance in a Marist school. It invites students to deepen their faith commitment through formal studies but also through prayer and other faith based activities and outreach. It pays careful attention to the individual, while not in any way compromising the essential teaching of our faith.
- Marist Education proposes **a discipline that is increasingly self-initiated** and a context in which students are sufficiently prepared to **accept responsibility for their adult life and for others in society**.
- Parental influences are the source of their daughter’s value system. The **involvement of parents** in the educative process reinforces the sense of community and welcome which characterises the Marist family spirit.

Special Character Events

Ash Wednesday, 5th March 2025

This is the first day of Lent, the beginning of a 40 day journey to Easter. Students participate in a liturgy where they receive a cross of ashes on their forehead. The ashes are cold and are the burnt palms from the previous year's Palm Sunday.

Retreat

At Marist College we take students out for a day of reflection and activities to unite them as a class and to add to their understanding of being Catholic. Retreats are held in Years 7, 9, 11 and 13.

Mass

We have a mass almost every Thursday Break 2 at St Mary's Church. Every Religious Education class takes a turn to prepare and lead a mass. This is a special event and on this day we ask that your daughter attend during her break time. The mass begins at 1:20pm and generally finishes at 1:50pm. You are welcome to attend these masses.

Full school Masses

Masses are very important and we expect full student attendance. You will be invited to attend these masses. There are three full school celebrations of the Eucharist each year:

The Inaugural Mass: Held within the first month of the start of the school year, on 21 February 2025. This Mass provides the College community to dedicate their year to God. The College leaders are inducted at this Mass. It is usually held at St Patrick's Cathedral in central Auckland.

Patrons' Mass: Celebrating all four House Patrons' on or about 30th May.

Marist Day: Begins with the celebration of the Eucharist. Marist Day will be held on 14th August 2025, the Feast of the Assumption of Mary. Traditionally Marists renewed their vows on this day and spent time in prayer in thanksgiving for their vocation. When he arrived in 1838, Bishop Pompallier dedicated New Zealand to Mary under this feast. It is the patronal feast day for New Zealand. It is a day of rejoicing in our being a Marist College community.

Sacramental Programme

Every year students are offered the opportunity to participate in the sacramental programme. This is part of our journey as Catholics. The sacramental programme in 2025 will take place during Terms 2 and 3. The sacraments will be conferred on Marist Day. The programme finishes two weeks after this special day. Students are able to receive Baptism, Reconciliation, Eucharist and Confirmation. Sacramental programme is for those students wishing to participate more fully in the life of the Catholic Church and part of this involves being present at Mass each Sunday in your parish.

Restorative Practices

Marist College has adopted a Restorative Practices approach to managing student behaviour. Restorative Practice is a relational approach to school life grounded in beliefs about equality, dignity, mana and the potential of all people. Student behaviour management is not a big issue at Marist College, overall, we are fortunate to work with respectful, receptive and collaborative students and families. However, we are always looking to improve our practice. We believe the Restorative Practices behaviour management model affirms and supports the Special Catholic Character of our college.

The Restorative Practice model focuses on building and maintaining positive, respectful relationships across the school community and offers school staff best-practice tools and techniques to restore relationships when things go wrong. By building and maintaining positive, respectful relationships within a school, staff to staff, staff to student and student to student, issues are more easily managed.

KiVa Bullying Prevention Programme

What is KiVa?

KiVa is an evidence-based bullying prevention programme that has been developed by the University of Turku, Finland. The effectiveness of KiVa has been proven through randomised control trials, together with a range of different studies. KiVa is being used around the world in over 18 different countries.

How does KiVa work?

The goal of KiVa is to prevent bullying and to teach how to manage cases of bullying effectively. The programme has been developed from decades of extensive research into bullying and is based on three main elements: prevention, intervention and monitoring.

Prevention – to keep bullying from happening

The preventive actions focus on our students learning how to prevent bullying. Student lessons taught in our junior school, and online games are examples of these kind of actions and form the foundation of KiVa.

Intervention – Tools to tackle bullying

The interventions in KiVa are targeted specifically at students who have been involved in bullying. It is a non-threatening approach, with the goal to provide students with solution-focused tools used to put an end to bullying.

Annual monitoring

We monitor the effectiveness of the KiVa program through an annual online survey for students. This feedback provides us with information on how to improve our bullying prevention work.

Complaints Procedures for Parents

Marist College is committed to ensuring that students receive a quality education in a safe environment. We welcome hearing from parents if they have a concern, or wish to discuss a situation pertaining to their daughter. - ➔ **Lock doors and turn off lights.** Leave blinds and windows as they are. Do NOT unlock doors.
- ➔ Information will be sent by email or SchoolBridge App as it becomes available.
Be patient.
- ➔ **The Principal or Deputy Principals will announce who they are and unlock all rooms when lockdown is given all clear. Further instructions will follow.**

In the event of a real emergency, parents will receive a text from the school and the website/facebook/SchoolBridge App will have regular updates.



Do not re-enter buildings.
- ➔ Move in an **orderly and calm** manner.
- ➔ **Students line up in Whanau Groups.**
- ➔ Teachers to check roll and advise Evacuation Co-ordinator.
- ➔ All staff to get their names crossed off the master roll.
- ➔ Office staff member to bring VisiTab and visitors to get their names checked off this list.
- ➔ A designated staff member will meet emergency services.
- ➔ **Be prepared to move** to an alternative evacuation area **if directed**.
- ➔ **ALL wait for dismissal until all clear given by Evacuation Co-ordinator.**





SchoolBridge App



SchoolBridge is a useful tool for students and Parents/Caregivers. It is a central location to access alerts, report absences, read daily notices, check calendars, read the newsletter, update contact details, book physio or counselling sessions and much more. It is available online by using the 'Sign In' option from our website, go directly to www.marist.bridge.school.nz, or you can download the 'SchoolBridge' app on your mobile phone from your usual app store. Once downloaded, students sign in with the Microsoft option and their school username and password. Parents/Caregivers sign in with their registered email address that has been provided to us for communications - use the relevant sign in method for your email type (Microsoft, Google, or Magic Link for all others).

Website

The school website address is www.maristcollege.school.nz and it contains information such as course outlines, upcoming events, the school calendar, uniform requirements, school sports, newsletters, etc.

Parent Portal

The Marist College Parent Portal can be found using the icon on the dashboard of our SchoolBridge App. This is where you can pay accounts and update your contact details should they change, so you can always be reached in the event of an emergency. You can also view attendance, notices and live reporting. Information regarding 2025 School Charges will be sent out to families early October 2024.

Absences

Please notify us via our SchoolBridge app **before 8:30am** on the day of your daughter's absence. Alternatively you can contact the school office on 846 8311 or email absences@maristcollege.school.nz. If no notification is received, a text will be sent to your parents/caregivers mobile phone. If she is absent for three consecutive days, you will need to provide a medical certificate.

Wellbeing/Hauora Centre

The School Nurse or Staff with first aid certificates supervise the Wellbeing Centre and handle minor issues. Parents will be contacted to collect their daughter if there is a more serious or urgent issue to be dealt with. Please do not send your daughter to school if she is unwell.

Parent Teacher and Friends Association (PTFA)

The PTFA is a parent support group open to all families. It is a positive way of becoming involved with your daughter's education and finding out more about the school. Meetings are held in the Staffroom and will be advertised in the weekly newsletter. Everyone is most welcome.

Notes

- **Fleece jumpers are no longer part of the uniform from 2022.**

BYOD Specifications

- Digital devices are compulsory for all Year 7-13 students.
- Marist College recommends a Windows or Mac laptop not a Chromebook or Tablet.
- Below is a list of specifications for purchasing a device. If your daughter currently has a device that meets the below specification, then there is no need to purchase a new one.
- Mobile phones are digital devices, but they are not acceptable as a learning device. They are not to be used, seen, or heard while on school property.



Recommended

- Operating System - Windows 10/11 or Mac OS
- Hard Drive 64GB+ (128GB+ recommended for Seniors)
- RAM 4GB+ (8GB+ recommended for Seniors)
- Battery Life 6 hours + (there are no charging facilities at school)

Not Recommended

- Chrome Books and Apple/Android Tablets
- Less than 64GB Hard Disk
- Less than 4GB RAM

Device considerations and installations

- Weight – Since students may have to carry their device plus other resources around from class to class, their device should weigh less than 1.5kg.
- Robustness – Device should be strong enough to survive a fall onto a hard surface. A padded protective sleeve or padded school bag is essential.
- Anti-virus software – For Windows or Mac devices, anti-virus and anti-spyware software are recommended to protect the data on the device and to prevent the device from being used to spread malware. Modern operating systems do have some antivirus software included.
- Windows 10S Devices are not recommended - If a student has Windows 10S our IT contractor will delete the S-mode to enable use at school. If this applies to your device please see our IT department to have this setting removed.

Additional requirements:

- Insurance – The school cannot accept responsibility for any device that is lost or stolen. Accidental damage insurance is usually available from suppliers.
- Warranty – Check this with the supplier. A minimum warranty of 1-year is standard, but this can be extended for a price.
- On-site support – No facilities are available for repairing damaged devices. This needs to be covered by the supplier. Account issues can be solved by the school I.T service. Assistance with day-to-day troubleshooting will be offered, where possible, by staff and trained students.
- Local suppliers include JB Hi-Fi, Noel Leeming, PB Technologies, Warehouse Stationery, etc.
- Misuse of digital technology (as in accordance with our Cybersafety Agreement, signed by all Marist College students regarding the responsible use of digital technology) will result in the item being stored in the school office for parents to collect.
- Marist College takes no responsibility for confiscated, lost or damaged mobile phones or digital devices.

- **Please note - For Windows devices with S-mode, please ensure S-mode is removed**

Reporting

Bi-weekly Engagement Report – sent every second Friday. This indicates your daughter's engagement in in-class learning on a scale of 1-4.

Live Reporting – we use live reporting on the parent portal for all school based assessments. Students produce the work, get assessed and their grade and comment is posted on the parent portal once marking and moderation are complete.

We send a summary of the live reporting twice a year. This is a PDF version of the reporting which is already available on the parent portal.

End of Year report – this contains the Whanau and Dean's comment, a summary of all extra-curricular activities and a final summary of the live reporting for the year.



Stationery Requirements

The College will NOT be selling stationery to students at the start of the school year. We ask you to purchase the necessary stationery for your daughter prior to the start of the school year.

Marist College Cybersafety Agreement (Copy)

The agreement covers the use of all digital devices (including mobile phones) at Marist College. This includes both school-owned and personal devices while you are at or representing the school, and any school resources used off site.

Computers and other digital equipment belonging to Marist College are provided for educational purposes, and should be treated as such.

ICT refers to any information and communication technology.

I have agreed that:

- 1 *My computer password is private and is not to be shared with other students*
- 2 *ICT must not be used for harassment, bullying, etc. I will not send intimidating, offensive or otherwise inappropriate emails, messages, images or any other communications.*
- 3 *I will report offensive and inappropriate activities to my teacher, parents or my Dean immediately.*
- 4 *I will not reveal home addresses or phone numbers (mine or anyone else's) in cyberspace.*
- 5 *Any videoing, photos or voice recording will be for learning purposes as directed by my teacher. I will complete the appropriate form and get permission from those I wish to film, photograph or record before I do so. I will not reproduce, distribute or post these recordings on any public sites e.g. Facebook, YouTube without permission from a teacher at Marist College.*
- 6 *I will not intentionally disrupt the smooth running of any computer or the school's network, or cause damage to any school-owned digital device or resource.*
- 7 *Digital equipment belonging to Marist College is provided for educational purposes. Any other ICT equipment that I use within the school environment (eg. mobile phone, own laptop, iPod) will be used for learning purposes as directed by my teacher.*
- 8 *I will not intentionally access inappropriate images or information online. If I accidentally encounter inappropriate, dangerous or illegal material I will immediately remove it from the screen/turn off the screen and notify a supervising teacher without disclosing the material to any other student. If I become aware of other students intentionally accessing inappropriate items I will notify a school staff member.*
- 9 *I recognise that any work or data stored on digital devices or associated with Marist College is not private and may be viewed by school staff at any time. This includes data on my own device.*
- 10 *I will not deliberately waste computer resources - e.g. unnecessary printing or internet use.*
- 11 *If I borrow a piece of digital equipment from the school it will only be used for school-related purposes. I will return it in the same condition in which I found it. I will cover the costs of any damage caused to school equipment that result from my misuse or negligence. I will report any accidental damage to a teacher immediately.*
- 12 *I will not plagiarise by copying text without referencing the source.*
- 13 *I will not use digital devices or resources for any purpose that will reflect negatively on Marist College.*

Student:

I am personally responsible for the use and security of any device I bring to school. I understand that the school is not liable for loss or damage to personal devices, However any loss or damage should be reported to the school immediately.

I understand and will abide by the conditions and rules as set out in this Cybersafety Agreement. I further understand that there may be consequences (including the possible loss of access and disciplinary action) if I should breach any of these conditions.

Parent or Guardian: You will have signed this on enrolment.

General use of information and communication technologies (ICT)

As the parent or guardian of this student, I have read the Marist College Cybersafety Agreement. I believe my child has read the document and understands her obligations. I understand that any breach of the rules and conditions as set out in this agreement can lead to loss of privileges or disciplinary action. I understand that if my daughter loses or damages equipment belonging to the school then this could result in a bill for the cost of replacement parts or repairs. I also understand this agreement applies to ICT equipment my daughter brings into Marist College. I understand that Marist College is not responsible for students' personal devices.

The internet

As the parent or guardian of this student, I understand that it may not be possible for the school to fully restrict exposure to inappropriate material in cyberspace, accessed via such means as the internet, email or text messaging. I also understand that while the College will take appropriate measures to limit access to illegal, dangerous or inappropriate material, ultimately it is each student's responsibility not to initiate access to, or have any involvement with such material.

Permission to publish

Under the Privacy Act 1993 we are required to seek your permission to publish material related to your daughter, including images and samples of her work. Marist College's website, newsletters, assemblies, presentations and the school magazine contain images of students and examples of their work to celebrate achievement, promote community and to give students examples of good practice. Marist College therefore undertake to ensure that no inappropriate material is published.

I hereby give permission for my daughter to be given access to computing and ICT equipment and for images of her to be published by the school.
