

Dancing in Samoa for the King

In late October, my sister Teugata and I had the extraordinary honour of performing with our dance group, Le Taupou Manaia (LTM), at the Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting (CHOGM) Official Welcome and State Banquet in Samoa.

LTM, founded in American Samoa and celebrating its 25th anniversary this year, is dedicated to preserving Samoan tradition and the art of Siva Samoa. The group, comprising branches from New Zealand, Samoa, and American Samoa, was invited by the Samoan Government as the main entertainment for the event, which honoured His Majesty King Charles III and Commonwealth leaders.

Although His Majesty retired early due to illness, we had the privilege of meeting leaders, including New Zealand Prime Minister Christopher Luxon and dignitaries from the UK, Fiji, Tonga, Brunei and many more. Their genuine interest in Samoan culture reaffirmed the power of cultural diplomacy in fostering global connections.

Performing with over 60 tama'ita'i Samoa (young Samoan women), aged 3 to 21, was heartwarming. Being able to foster a sisterhood within LTM and the ability to collaborate with our very own New Zealand choreographer made the experience unforgettable. A highlight was visiting the Samoa Victim Support Group, where we performed and brought donations, creating moments of joy for the children. It was especially special having the opportunity to bring our international student at Marist, Melody Le, and show her around the beautiful Islands of Samoa.

Performing on this international stage was not only a personal milestone but also a celebration of the vibrant traditions that define us as a people.

We are humbled and grateful to have carried a piece of Samoa to the world stage and hope to inspire others to embrace and celebrate their cultural heritage.
