Malosi Project – Parliamentary Debate

The Malosi Project is a student-lead organisation of Pasifika law students at UoA who aim to encourage and support other Pasifika students to

study law. They organise one or two events each year and invite Pasifika Year 12-13 students to the campus for a jam-packed day of activities to give students an idea of what it is like to study law at university, as well as the support available for Pacific students. Sports and Extra Curricular Charges: any sports or extra-curricular for Term 1 should now be paid. Please ensure any charges added to the account are paid by the required due date.


