From the Principal

The Importance of Attendance at Marist College

Attendance is a cornerstone of student achievement. Regular school attendance is vital not only for academic success but also for emotional and social development. At Marist College, attendance is closely monitored by whānau teachers, deans, the senior leadership team, and administration staff. Over the past three years, our attendance rates have steadily improved, returning to pre-COVID levels. This progress reflects the strong partnerships we've built with families to ensure our young women are present and engaged in their learning.

Why is Regular Attendance So Important?

Attendance has a profound impact on school culture. With strong attendance rates this year, there's a noticeable, positive energy throughout the school. Marist is alive with activity, students arrive early for tutorials and sports training, school vans are constantly in use for trips and learning outside the classroom, and after-school winter sports are in full swing. Regular attendance helps students build strong peer relationships, fosters trust, and contributes to a more connected and supportive school environment.

Choosing What's Right Over What's Easy

While there are always valid reasons for student absences and we are committed to supporting families when these arise, there are still some students who choose not to attend regularly. Common reasons include last-minute assessment preparation, avoiding certain school events, or simply feeling tired and staying home. As a parent, I understand how real these challenges can be. However, I also know that setting clear expectations and boundaries early on helps establish a routine of regular attendance that benefits students in the long run.

How You Can Support Us

We ask that parents and caregivers continue to support regular attendance by:

- Encouraging your daughter to attend school every day, unless they are genuinely unwell.
- Communicating with the school if your daughter is absent and providing a genuine reason.
- Helping your daughter establish good routines around sleep, homework, and preparation for the school day.
- Reinforcing the importance of commitment, resilience, and participation in all aspects of school life.

Marist Shakespeare Club and the SGCNZ Sheilah Winn Festival

Students from the Marist Shakespeare Club performed scenes from two Shakespeare plays at Epsom Girls Grammar as part of the SGCNZ Sheilah Winn Central Festival of Shakespeare in schools in Term 1 this year.

This festival has run across schools throughout New Zealand for 33 years now and can lead to further learning opportunities via Shakespeare's texts such as the SGCNZ National Festival in Wellington and, if chosen, going to the Globe stage in London to do workshops.

Two Marist groups, comprised of juniors, pulled together, interpreted and directed two scenes from Shakespeare's plays. They performed in between other school groups from the central region. The groups did all this work within the very busy school term and extracurricular calendar of Term 1.

Wonderful photos and videos of their performances have come through as has positive and helpful

feedback from the adjudicators. The students impressed the judges with their understanding of the scenes and choice of costumes to illuminate the ideas within one of the scenes. They found the experience to be exciting, nerve wracking, fulfilling and a great learning experience.

The Marist Shakespeare club continues to meet once a week at lunchtime. Students explore scenes and will begin to prepare for next year's festival.

Today, we had some special visitors from Blake, an organisation named after Sir Peter Blake, a famous New Zealand sailor! Blake came to our school with the goal of inspiring the younger generation to learn more about marine life and the current state of New Zealand's oceans.

We learned about healthy and unhealthy marine ecosystems, the different creatures that live in our seas, as well as issues like overfishing and pollution, and how we can prevent this. The best part was that we experienced all of this through VR! It was such a cool way of learning.

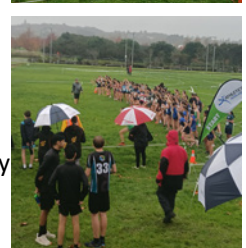
Cross Country Championships

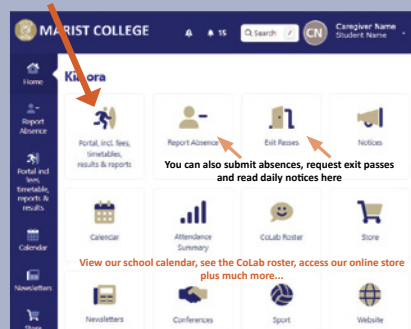

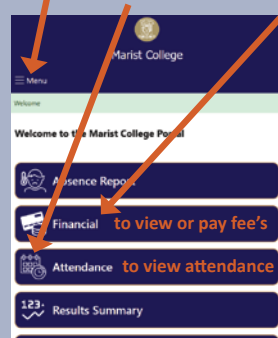

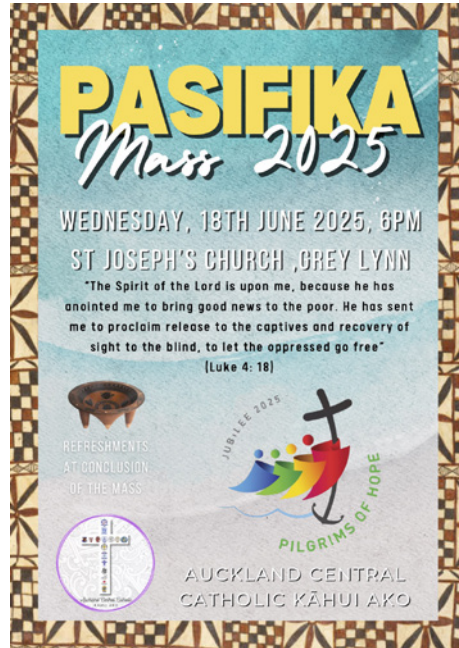
