There were also separate seminars on during the evening, including a presentation from Police with a Police dog, explanation of the pathway to Medicine at Auckland or Otago Universities, descriptions of some less well known career paths such as Surveying, Ecology, and Landscape Architecture, and a presentation from a career Fire Fighter about his journey through studying and working as a professional Engineer, and then switching to the fire service. Six Year 13 leaders from each school shared responsibilities in hosting the event, working very well together as a team. 
# **FUN FACT**


